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The Jefferson County Solid Waste & Air Quality Collection Program will now only accept hazardous waste from small businesses, churches, schools, emergency services, and Jefferson County facilities that fill out a VSQG (Very Small Quantity Generator) form. A no obligation disposal price quote will be provided prior to bringing material to the collection facility.

## What Is e-waste?

- **Lamps:** Fluorescent, High Intensity Discharge, Neon, Specialty Lamps
- **Electronics:** VCRs, Stereos, Telephones, Copiers, Fax Machines, Cash Registers, TVs, Copper and Aluminum Wire, Panels, Controllers

- **Computer Equipment:** PCs, Mainframes, Central Processing Units (CPUs), Auxiliary Equipment, Switches, Wiring, Printers, Scanners/Readers, Keyboards, Zip Drives, Circuit Boards, Monitors/Cathode Ray Tubes (CRTs)

- **Batteries:** Commercial, Industrial, Household
- **Electrical Equipment:** Transformers, Ballasts, Capacitors, Circuit Breakers, Switches, Bushings and Cable

- **Items Containing Mercury Waste:** Fluorescent, High Intensity Discharge and Specialty Lamps, Electrical Devices, Precision Instruments, Medical Apparatus, Mercury Compounds, Debris and Contaminated Soil, Automotive and Other Switches

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## Pharmaceutical Waste

Clean Sweep **now** accepts old prescription drugs. Help keep our water safe and bring old prescription and over-the-counter drugs for safe disposal. \$10 fee per vehicle, drive-up service, confidential, vet/pet meds included. Keep in original containers. Cross out your name and prescription number. No sharps/needles or radioactive materials. (Call your local health department for sharp disposal.)

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## Proper Disposal

- Stores that sell car batteries must accept them back for recycling.
- Give leftovers to someone who will use them up for their intended purpose. Reuse products such as paint thinner and paint.
- Never pour oil, antifreeze or other hazardous materials on the ground, into storm sewers or down the drain.
- All tires should be recycled at the time of new tire purchase. Clean Sweep does not accept tires.

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## Disposal of Latex Paint

**Step 1:** Find an **outside** work area away from children, pets and rain. Locked screen porches and balconies work well. Because some old latex paint contains mercury, it's important to dry out paint outdoors in a safe place.

**Step 2:** Dry it out. Remove the lid and let the paint dry in the can. Stir the paint occasionally to speed drying. **Or**, brush paint in layers on newspaper or cardboard. **For larger amounts of latex:** Pour one-inch layers of paint into a cardboard box lined with plastic. Allow the paint to dry one layer at a time—thin layers will speed up the drying process. **Or**, mix paint with cat litter, sawdust or sand in a cardboard box lined with plastic and let it dry.

**Step 3:** Throw the dried paint, cans and other materials in the trash. Leave the lids off paint cans so trash collectors will see that the paint is dry.
