The Planning and Zoning Department is responsible for the implementation and enforcement of the Jefferson County Agricultural Preservation and Land Use Plan and Zoning Ordinance, which includes state regulations in Wisconsin Administrative Rules NR135, ATCP51 and NR115, and Chapters 59.69 and 66.1001 of Wisconsin Statutes; Private Sewage System Ordinance including DSPS383 and Chapters 59.7 and 145 of Wisconsin Statutes; the Floodplain Ordinance including state regulations in NR116 and federal regulations in CFR 44 pt.60; Shoreland/Wetland Ordinance including NR115; Land Division/Subdivision Ordinance including Chapters 59 and 236 of Wisconsin Statutes; Clean Sweeps with their education components for the Solid Waste Program; and Wisconsin Fund Grant Program and Private On-Site Waste Treatment System (POWTS) maintenance involving DSPS383 and Chapter 145 of State Statutes. These programs are administered with a staff of six and the involvement of the Jefferson County Board of Supervisors, Planning and Zoning Committee, Corporation Counsel and federal and state agencies including the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, State of Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR), Department of Safety and Professional Services (DSPS), Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) and Department of Administration (DOA). This Department functions under the direction of the Planning and Zoning Director who is appointed by the County Administrator. Policy guidance is provided by the County Board's Planning and Zoning Committee.

Two thousand fourteen was another challenging year for the Planning and Zoning Department. The severe economic downturn in construction activity which began in 2007 has continued, but it appears that permit revenues may have finally stabilized at historically low levels. The lack of new home construction and related permitting continues to have a negative effect on Department revenues and budget. The Department issued a total of 477 Zoning and Land Use Permits for 2014, an increase of 9% compared with 2013 permit numbers. This included 54 new, single-family residences, compared with 67 new, single-family residences permitted in 2013, 57 in 2012, 52 in 2011, 66 in 2010 and 85 in 2009, 102 in 2008 and 150 in 2007. Fee increases which were approved by County Board over the last several years are beginning to help the bottom line due to the increase in permits. This Department's revenues have stabilized. Revenue numbers for the first half of 2015 project a slight increase over 2014 figures, and we are hopeful that this trend will continue, allowing the Department to meet or exceed its budget projections.

Two thousand fourteen also saw a continued workload from the "Great Flood" of 2008. FEMA-mandated substantial damage inspections came to a conclusion for most residences located in the floodplain of Jefferson County. The Planning and Zoning Department continued to issue permits and conducted reassessments throughout the year as county residents repaired, reconstructed, filed for buyout or removed damaged or substantially damaged residences. Two thousand fourteen saw the issuance of 5 floodplain-related permits, as well as 14 shoreland/wetland permits. In other flood-related matters, the new FIRM (Flood Insurance Rate Maps), were adopted and effective as of February 4, 2015. The new study and maps are available for Jefferson County property owners to view in the office or they can contact FEMA.GOV for floodplain

information regarding their properties. The Department also completed its Community Assistance Visit (CAV) audit with DNR, to review our floodplain program. The last such audit was in 1994. Continued enforcement of floodplain regulations keeps Jefferson County and its residents eligible for flood insurance, federal backed mortgages, and disaster assistance from the federal government. Department staff also has also been working on the state-mandated rewrite of our shoreland/wetland ordinances as required by NR115. However, due to recent action by the state legislature, revisions are needed and required adoption of the new shoreland/wetland ordinances relating to NR115 has been extended until October of 2016. We are awaiting DNR's new model ordinance reflecting the changes in the 2015 state budget.

The Jefferson County Planning and Zoning Department and Planning and Zoning Committee continues its implementation of the Jefferson County Agricultural Preservation and Land Use Plan approved by DATCP and adopted by County Board in February 2012, using it in staff's daily work as well as the Zoning Committee's decision-making processes and recommendations to County Board. From 2000 through 2014 under the 1999 and 2012 Agricultural Preservation and Land Use Plans, 36,729 acres have been protected from further A-3 Rural Residential lot development, with a total of 989 lots created, covering 1,988 acres, at an average lot size of 2.010 acres each. For 2014, 41 A-3 lots were effectuated, covering 96.44 acres, averaging 2.35 acres each. By adopting and implementing the Agricultural Preservation and Land Use Plan, Jefferson County remains compliant with the Farmland Preservation Program, Wis. Stats. Chapter 91, allowing its landowners to participate in the program and remain eligible for a tax credit. Department of Revenue statistics regarding the number of claimants and the number of acres utilizing this tax credit were not available for 2014 (2013 tax year) at the time of preparing this report. Farmland credits for 2013 (2012 tax year claims) showed 632 claimants received \$727,372 which included 99,539 acres in farmland preservation. For 2012 (2011 tax year claims) Department of Revenue showed 742 claimants received \$778,418 which included 109,243 acres in farmland preservation. For 2011 (2010 tax year claims) Department of Revenue showed 791 claimants received \$779,912 which included 120,061 acres in farmland preservation.

Zoning Department staff handled violations concerning enforcement of all Ordinances under our jurisdiction. For 2014, we had 64 active violations and issued 2 citations. The Planning and Zoning Department would like to thank Corporation Counsel Phil Ristow and his office for all their hard work and assistance and wish him well in retirement! We have begun working with our new Corporation Counsel, Blair Ward, and will continue our enforcement efforts under his guidance.

In the next year or two, review and possible text amendments to the Zoning Ordinance will include a new Shoreland ordinance, Wind Generator ordinance, Subdivision ordinance, POWTS Maintenance ordinance, Exotic Animal ordinance and any other changes required by the State or Federal governments. As of February 4th, 2015, the County adopted the new Floodplain Ordinance as required by DNR and FEMA, along with the new FIS study and Floodplain FIRM maps.

Our Department also regulates and inspects the installation of all new and replacement septic systems known as private on-site waste treatment systems (POWTS) in the county. Each septic installation is required by law to be inspected for proper installation. Two thousand fourteen saw a total of 99 new and replacement POWTS. This compares to 91 in 2013, 80 in 2012, 93 in 2011, 113 in 2010 and 119 in 2009, 117 in 2008, but is significantly below 2007 levels when we had 168 new and replacement POWTS. Our inspectors are also required to verify soils on POWTS installations, including replacement systems. In 2014, this Department conducted 99 soil test reviews and inspections. We also continue to administer the Wisconsin Fund Program, which makes money available to replace failing private sewage systems for those property owners meeting income criteria. For 2014, two applicants received a total of \$6,100. In the most recent program year, we did not have any applicants for this program. Since the program's inception in 1991, Jefferson County taxpayers have received approximately \$588,906 for septic system rehabilitation. Unfortunately, during the budget bill in 2015, the money allotted to this program has been drastically cut and may be on the way out in the next state budget. We have also begun work on the state-mandated POWTS septic maintenance program, which requires a complete inventory of all existing private on-site waste treatment systems in the County by 2017, and implementation of a POWTS maintenance program by 2019. This law requires all property owners with a POWTS (septic system) to report pumping and maintenance on their POWTS (septic system) to the County, every 3 years. As a result, this Department will end up tracking compliance for approximately 9,060 systems.

In 2014, Sharon Ehrhardt and the Solid Waste/Air Quality Committee continued its task of providing recycling education and holding clean sweep events for the households and farms of Jefferson County. Two thousand fourteen host-fee revenues of \$63,490 received from Deer Track Park Landfill as part of the negotiated landfill agreement for Deer Track Park, provided the main funding source for all Solid Waste Programs. This funding source is based on the tonnage of waste taken in at the landfill and fluctuates with economic conditions. State grant money is also utilized but is variable from year to year. In 2014 the Department received \$29,705 in grant funding from DATCP. The City of Watertown again provided \$20,000 for 2014 to cover the cost of the Watertown Clean Sweep event, and multiple towns and municipalities of Jefferson County responded to the need for funding by donating a total of \$6,025 to help with this worthwhile program. Revenues of \$6,600 were collected from the electronics e-waste recycling. This is changing in 2015, and we will now be charged to recycle e-waste. The Solid Waste Committee is currently reviewing the sustainability of this part of our program going forward.

In 2014, four clean sweep events were held, accounting for 948,621 pounds of household, appliances, agricultural, electronic and pharmaceutical wastes being recycled instead of ending up in our local landfill. Three hundred thirteen citizens were served by clean sweep events in 2014 at a cost to the County of \$66,397. The Solid Waste/Air Quality Committee continues its partnerships with the cities of Watertown, Fort Atkinson, Jefferson, Whitewater and Waterloo, Town of Ixonia, Walworth County, Jefferson County Sheriff's Office, Watertown, Lake Mills, Fort Atkinson, Jefferson, Whitewater,

and UW-Whitewater Police Departments, WPPI Energy, Waste Management, as well as multiple private businesses, organizations, and corporate sponsors, so we could offer permanent drop-off sites for electronic e-waste, appliances, and drugs for the convenience and safety of Jefferson County residents. The future success of all solid waste programs depends upon these types of partnerships. Special thank-you's go out to Sheriff Paul Milbrath for his continued support and volunteer hours working the clean sweep events as well as the drug drop off program and all the Pharmacists who regularly help at clean sweep events sorting drugs.

Education efforts by the Committee continued in 2014 through newspaper articles and information posted on the Department's website, Sharon's participation in multiple speaking engagements to various service organizations, and radio interviews to get the word out about Jefferson County's recycling program. Sharon also visited all 16 Towns and all cities and villages within the County to educate and expand awareness of our clean sweep program. The recycling video which was completed in 2012 has also been provided to schools and posted on our webpage for educating the public regarding our recycling programs. Two thousand fourteen saw the continued popularity and usage of the drug drop-off box located at the Sheriff's Office, and additional drug drop-off boxes located at the Fort Atkinson, Lake Mills, Watertown, UW-Whitewater, and Whitewater Police Departments. This allowed citizens to properly dispose of unused, outdated drugs and pharmaceuticals at their convenience rather than holding them until the next clean sweep event. These drug drop boxes have been unbelievably successful and popular with citizens. For 2014, this program has led to 1,930 pounds of drugs being kept out of the landfill, our water supply, and our kids' and grandkids' hands. In 2014, Jefferson County exceeded 2.6 million pounds of electronic e-waste collected. This milestone was achieved in a little over 3 years and demonstrates a great willingness and acceptance by the public to utilize our recycling program which now includes permanent electronics and appliance drop off sites. The recycling of e-waste is now in jeopardy however, due to the abrupt change in costs for this service. Stay tuned for further developments regarding the future of e-waste recycling. Attached to this report, you will find our updated brochure regarding the solid waste program for Jefferson County.

Two thousand fourteen presented a multitude of challenges, obstacles and opportunities for the Planning and Zoning Department. Most of our time involves the implementation, operation and enforcement of the County Zoning, Sanitation, and Subdivision Ordinances, as well as federal and state-mandated programs which include the Floodplain and Shoreland/Wetland and POWTS programs. Land Use regulations are in a continual state of flux, and seem to change regularly as politics often win out over common sense and court actions continually mold and shape land use regulation. Looking ahead to 2015 our reduced staff will meet with more change that will keep us on our toes and remind us to be flexible yet vigilant in our pursuit of maintaining Jefferson County's vision as documented in its plans and ordinances. I would also like to thank the Zoning Committee and Board of Adjustment for their support, dedication, and hard work, and the Solid Waste Committee for their hands on involvement in our clean sweep events.

Attached you will find several documents, charts, and graphs depicting a variety of datum relating to items mentioned in this report. 



Keep liquid medications in their containers and place in plastic bags. We don't want medication containers or wrappings except for the liquid containers. No sharps/needles, epi-pens, radioactive materials, oxygen tanks or medical equipment. Check with your local health department, pharmacy or clinic/hospital for sharps disposal.


