





















Safer at Home

This information is updated from Governor Evers' Executive Order #28 & #34 Effective Dates: April 24, 2020 through May 26th, 2020

All Services & Business should follow proper social distance requirements.

The list below is a summary of the broader topics that affect most of the community. This order identifies essential functions and services. The list of exceptions is long and in some cases self-explanatory. Please see the order for specific industries. For those that are identified as non-essential and therefore not allowed to operate in their traditional manner, they are permitted to meet minimum basic operations:

- The minimum necessary activities to maintain the value of the businesses inventory, preserve the condition of the business's physical plant and equipment, ensure security, process payroll and employer benefits, or for related functions, including where these functions are outsourced to other entities.
- The minimum necessary activities to facilitate employees of the business being able to continue to work remotely from their residences.
- Non-essential businesses will now be able to do more things as Minimum Basic Operations, including deliveries, mailings and curbside pick-up.

	Automatic or self-service car washes are able to operate.		Outdoor recreational rentals, such as boats, golf carts, kayaks, ATVs and other similar recreational vehicles now allowed.
	Golf courses may open again, with restrictions referenced in the order, Page 6, C 1-7.		Childcare Facilities are still operating and shall prioritize care for families in accordance with the list provided in the order.
	Arts and craft stores may offer expanded curbside pick-up of materials necessary to make face masks or other personal protective equipment. (PPE)		Veterinary care for animals is allowed: non-essential care should be rescheduled.
	Organizations that provide charitable and social services can operate. See page #14, "13G" of the Governor's Order		Construction projects may continue. Aesthetic or optional exterior lawn care or construction is now allowed under the extended order, so long as it can be done by one person.
	Restaurants and bars have no changes and can continue operating with take-out and delivery (food only).		Stores that sell groceries and medicine remain open. See order page 12, item 13B for more information.
	Weddings and funerals may continue if they meet the 10 people or less restriction.		Hardware stores and construction supply stores may continue to operate following social distancing.
	People are strongly encouraged to stay close to home, not travel to second homes or cabins, and do not to travel out-of-state if it is not necessary.		Industry specific services – Emergency Order, Item #12, page 13
	Taxi and transportation providers may still operate. Riders should social distance as much as possible (single riders sit in back, not in front seat).		Gyms and fitness centers will be closed.
	Citizens may leave their homes for doctor visits, essential supplies, groceries, prescriptions, outdoor activities. Outdoor activities shall NOT include team or contact sports (ex. Basketball, soccer, football) Parks will be open, Playgrounds will be CLOSED.		Essential Businesses or Operations that remain open for in-person sales, including retail stores, shall: For stores with less than 50,000 square feet of customer floor space, limit the number of people in the store including employees to 25% of the total occupancy. For stores of more than 50,000 square feet, limit the number of customers in the store at one time (excluding employees) to 4 people per 1,000 square feet of customer floor space.
